First Year

- **Speech Language Pathology Assistant:** You can become an SLP assistant by earning a certificate from Alexandria Technical & Community College after completing your SLHS degree.
- American Sign Language Interpreter: M State has an ASL interpreting program. A bachelor's degree is needed to become a certified interpreter.
